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












Joe and Vera's special gift



Joe and Vera's special gift

It's "written in the walls" of Aurora Zilber Family Hospice



Joe and Vera Zilber made a generous gift that laid the foundation for Aurora Zilber Family Hospice.

Joe and Vera Zilber left an indelible legacy all over their beloved city of Milwaukee. Whether it's the Zilber School of Public Health at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee or the Zilber Neighborhood Initiative; Joe and Vera 's passion to make Milwaukee better is evident. And at Aurora Zilber Family Hospice, that commitment is literally written in the walls.

It was early 2002 when Joe and Vera first decided they wanted to help bring the hospice to life. In Joe's book, "How I Built an Empire and Gave it Away," he shares the hospice experience they had with their own son Jimmy, and Vera's sister Joanie, had left a lasting impression. Joe was also eager to work with the program, now known as "Aurora at Home" to make it happen.

"(Aurora at Home) was a pioneer organization nationally in the area of hospice care. They go back more than 100 years, caring for the disabled, the elderly and the terminally ill. Both Vera and I were excited about the possibilities of helping out," Joe wrote.

The Zilbers committed \$1 million to create Aurora Zilber Family Hospice. It was the seed money that helped organizers secure the rest that was needed to complete the facility in just six months. Unfortunately, Vera wasn't able to see the finished project. She passed away suddenly in October 2003 before the facility even broke ground. However, on a "hard hat" tour in 2004, Joe and about 50 other friends and family members-- some of them donors as well-- got out pencils and each wrote their own special message to Vera on the drywall in an unfinished sunroom of the building.

"Vera, What a tribute to your family in this beautiful setting! May the patients who come here feel your welcome and the eternal blessings of God!" That was the message from Art Wigchers, who was the President of Zilber, Ltd. at the time, and his wife Mary Ann.

"The written messages would be preserved for years and years within the hospice walls. In a way, those messages gave the hospice a soul," Joe wrote.

And 10 years later, Vera's warm welcome has been felt by over 5,000 families. Joe himself was even brought to Aurora Zilber in 2010 when his health quickly deteriorated on a plane ride to Wisconsin from Hawaii. Joe's daughter Marcy Jackson says her parents would be truly proud to see what their gift has become.

"My mother was a graceful, elegant and caring woman who made everyone feel at ease and comfortable. My father was a playful yet practical man. The hint of laughter in his voice and the twinkle in his eye were as much a part of him as his readiness to move on to the next adventure. My parents' legacy lives on in what the staff and volunteers at the hospice do so well - bringing grace and comfort to ease the way for people nearing the end of life," says Marcy.

Partnering to give cancer patients new hope

Hope is getting a new home in the form of a brand new state-of-the-art cancer center in western Racine and Walworth Counties. Aurora Health Care Foundation's Partners in Cancer Care campaign was officially launched in January of 2015. It's a two year, \$2.2 million community fundraising effort to expand patient services at the new cancer center. In less than a year, over \$1.6 million has already been raised! What helped jump start the campaign was a \$1 million gift earlier this year from the Memorial Hospital of Burlington Community Foundation.



The new Aurora Cancer Care center is part of a larger Aurora Health Center being built near Spring Valley Road and Highway 36.

"There's a lot of excitement over Aurora making such a big investment in this community. We just haven't seen this before and now that it's happening people want to get behind it," says Chris Miller, Memorial Hospital of Burlington Community Foundation President.

The Benefit Ball Committee at Aurora Lakeland Medical Center also committed \$340,000 for a café at the facility, and the McGMO golf outing has pledged \$225,000. We are truly grateful for these generous gifts, plus to supporters of this year's Crystal Ball in Burlington, Lombardi Walk to Tackle Cancer in Williams Bay, Waterford Balloonfest and Color for Care event: all of which contributed to the Partners in Cancer Care campaign.

A community of first responders

There is an emergency in Ozaukee and Sheboygan Counties and donors are responding to the call! The When Minutes Matter campaign was launched in October 2014, and has now grown to a \$650,000 effort that will support emergency services in both counties. So far, we are about halfway there with nearly \$300,000 raised.

The national average survival rate from out-of-hospital cardiac arrest is around 5%. This campaign aims to improve that by: implementing Emergency Medical Dispatch, supporting EMS on-scene, providing additional EMS training through computerized patient simulation. placement of Automated External Defibrillators in the community and training our communities in CPR. To date, the campaign has helped train more than 300 people in CPR, and another significant achievement is just around the corner.

"We are excited to help implement Emergency Medical Dispatch this November, which will enable 911 dispatchers to offer life-saving, pre-arrival instructions prior to professional help arriving. This will improve survival rates from cardiac arrest and other serious medical conditions." says Steven Zils, MD, Out of Hospital Medical Director for Aurora Medical Center in Grafton and Sheboygan.

It's all possible because of gifts to Aurora Family Service's Family to Family Thanksgiving program. A donation of




Sharon was overwhelmed with gratitude as her van was filled with turkeys and grocery bags of food in 2014.

In 2014, Sharon picked up bags of food for 25 families. She says the school is already looking for families to participate in 2015 and she can't wait to help spread the joy.

"When I get back here with the food, many of the kids help unload all of the groceries and they just really appreciate it. It's so wonderful how people really do care," she says.

How bereavement services helped Robert Sobczak on the road to healing

Robert and Nancy Sobczak were together 39 wonderful years. When you hear how fondly he speaks of her, it is clear he simply adored her.

"The thing about Nancy, she was so many things; an engineer, a farm girl, a singer, a pilot. She was so passionate about Marquette University," Robert says. "She was a gourmet cook. She could do so many wonderful things."

Because Nancy was the true love of his life, you can also imagine the heartbreaking devastation Robert felt when he lost her. Nancy was diagnosed in 2008 with breast cancer; it was an aggressive form and eventually spread to her brain and spine. By 2011, after an incredibly courageous fight, her battle ended. Nancy spent three days at Aurora Zilber Family Hospice. lost his wife, Nancy.

"That's where Nancy softly stepped into eternity. And yet months later, their job wasn't over. I was surprised when they called me and suggested their bereavement meetings," Robert says.

Robert attended eight bereavement sessions and learned that grieving is a process of discovery. "The process was very revealing to me. The answers are within you, you just have to find the right people to bring them out. Being able to go through it with people who were in the same boat as me was really a Godsend," he says.

Jocelynn Hosea-Davis is the Bereavement Coordinator at Aurora Zilber Family Hospice. Her goal is to keep in touch with families for at least 13 months after their loved one passes away.

"We do outreach calls, support groups, bereavement workshops and other things to build coping skills. 13 months is important because it gets them past that one year anniversary," Jocelynn says.

Robert still keeps in touch with the other people in his bereavement group; they get together about once a month. He also comes back to Aurora Zilber every year around the time of Nancy's passing, to make a financial gift as well.

"I look forward to coming back," Robert shares. "I don't know if I would be where I am today if it wasn't for Aurora Zilber. I feel so fortunate that we found it."

Verizon Foundation provides grant to help more high risk patients recover at home

A generous grant of \$15,600 from the Verizon Foundation will allow Aurora at Home to add 20 new telemonitoring units that will help an estimated 200 additional patients with in-home health monitoring needs.

"This gift will support the continued growth and development of Aurora at Home's Telemonitor Program. The additional equipment will allow for increased ability to provide chronic disease management and selfmanagement support for vulnerable patient populations in the community," said Melissa Jordan, RN, Director of Quality at Aurora at Home.

Telemonitoring services allows patients to be safely monitored in the comforts of their own home. This includes even the most vulnerable patients, like people treated for heart disease, high blood pressure and other conditions. Through remote patient monitoring, patients can view their individual health action plans, recognize early warning signs and receive chronic disease management strategies and education. Aurora at Home Registered Nurses work with physicians to remotely monitor a patient's condition and progress. This includes monitoring the vital signs of heart rate, blood pressure, weight, oxygen saturation and temperature.
